
The Fab Five

Scottie Pippen

Dazzling the star-studded cast of the 1992 NBA All-Star game by throwing down three vicious stuffs in the first quarter (including the beauty above courtesy of Mark Price) was Mr. Scottie Maurice Pippen, who filled in for an injured Larry Bird. Pip finished with 14 points in 21 minutes, all while wearing a pair of the Air Flight Huaraches in original white, purple and blue colorblocking.





Stacey "Plastic Man" Augmon

UNLV Runnin' Rebels alum Stacey Augmon rocked some Flight Huaraches, this time in Red and White to match his ATL squad colors. With one of the iller nicknames of the '90s, Plastic Man did the Huaraches proud in 1992, racking up around 14 a game for the Hawks.




Michael Johnson

Before blinding everyone in sight with the gold dipped Swoosh joints he wore in 1996, sprinter Michael Johnson hugged his feet with purple Air Huarache Runners. If the legs of the once heralded "Fastest Man in the World" could hang with the shoes, there's no excuse for present day sprinters not to swoop a pair of the 2012 Free Runners.



Reggie Miller

The often hated, Jumpman logo donning, bomber of a shooting guard Reggie Miller didn't always wear his rival's signature sleds. In the 1992 NBA Playoffs against the Celtics, Killer Miller wore white and blue Air Flight Huaraches and almost forged an 18-point comeback victory in Game 3 of the series. Although the Pacers got swept, Reggie and his then high-top fade put up 27 per during those three games, all the while shooting a very Miller-esque 63 percent from downtown.



Michael Jordan

Michael Jordan not wearing his own namesake brand is always a sight to behold as it begs the question: What is he showing off instead? After shrugging away the Blazers in six games in the 1992 NBA Finals, Money took a break from his Air Jordan VIIs and chilled out in some fresh white and purple Air Huaraches to enjoy the festivities.



Christian Laettner

The saying "imitation is the most sincere form of flattery" could not be more true in the curious case of Christian Laettner and the shoes made popular by his former Wolverine foes. Added on as the token college player of the inaugural Dream Team, Laettner, the former golden boy of Duke and foil to many a Michigander, did the unthinkable by donning a pair of Flight Huaraches as he no doubt assumed bag carrying duties as part of the nearly flawless US Olympic Squad from 1992. Removing Laettner from the Dream Team is like putting on Kanye's The College Dropout and passing over the skits – the result equals perfection.



Kobe Bryant

One of the more recent ambassadors of the Nike Air Flight Huaraches was one time sneaker free-agent Kobe Bryant, here donning a pair of white, yellow and purple 2003 edition retros. Mamba only averaged 24 per for the '03 season, but since then his scoring hasn't dipped below 25 a game. Bryant would also wear a player exclusive Flight Huarache in black which was never released to the market.
